
- The rebranding, extension and relaunch (31st Jan 2024) of Community Pharmacy Services (started 2019) – incorporating what was previously 'Community Pharmacist Consultation Service' (CPCS)
- Community pharmacy contractors must provide all 3 elements of PFS:

1. Clinical Pathways (new element)	2. Minor Illness Referral	3. Urgent Repeat Medicines supply NB Not from general practices but from NHS 111 and UEC settings


Why Pharmacy First Service (PFS)?



- To help with capacity in practices, so practice appointments can be used for patients who really need them
- To improve access for patients with minor illnesses
- To change patient behaviour so they go to community pharmacy as the 'first port of call' for minor illness and medicines advice
- To support the integration of community pharmacies into the PCN team
- To create improved relationships between practices and community pharmacies to deliver high quality and integrated care to patients
- To help patients self-manage their health more effectively with the support of community pharmacists

Clinical Pathways:

 7 common health conditions, where Pharmacist can offer advice to patients and supply NHS medicines (including some prescriptiononly medicines under patient group directions (PGDs)):

1) Uncomplicated UTI

Includes: Women aged 16-64yrs with suspected lower UTI


Excludes: Pregnant individuals, urinary catheters, recurrent UTI (2 episodes in last 6mths, 3 episodes in last 12mths)

2) Sore Throat

Includes: Adults and children aged 5yrs and over Excludes: Pregnant individuals under 16yrs

3) Sinusitis

Includes:	Adults and children aged 12yrs and over
Excludes:	immunosuppressed individuals, chronic sinusitis (sinusitis that causes symptoms that last for more than 12wks), pregnant individuals under 16yrs







Check if you have impetigo

Impetigo starts with red sores or blisters, but the redness may be harder to see in brown and black skin.

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




Contraceptive Service – Review (12m supply)

Blood Pressure Service

Advanced service specification: NHS community pharmacy hypertension case-finding advanced service (NHS community pharmacy blood pressure check service) (england.nhs.uk)


- A community pharmacist will opportunistically measure the blood pressure of consenting adults who come into the pharmacy, by offering anyone a free blood pressure check who:
 - is over the age of 40;
 - has not previously been identified as having hypertension or a related condition; and
 - has not had their blood pressure measured by a health professional within the previous six months.
- At the end of a consultation, where readings indicate:

90/60–139/89mmHg (Normal blood pressure):	the pharmacist will promote healthy behaviours.
140/90–179/119mmHg (High blood pressure):	the pharmacist will offer Ambulatory Blood Pressure Monitoring (ABPM) from the pharmacy and will also promote healthy behaviours.
>=180/120mmHg (very high blood pressure):	the pharmacist will urgently refer the patient to see their GP within 24 hours and the pharmacist will inform the patient's GP practice by NHS mail or via another locally agreed platform.
<90/60mmHg (low blood pressure):	the pharmacist will provide appropriate advice and may also refer the patient to emergency services e.g. A&E if there are any concerns.

- All blood pressure readings are sent to the general practice from the community pharmacy so records can be updated and appropriate action taken.
- General practices can refer patients to a participating community pharmacy for a clinic blood pressure reading or for 24 hour ambulatory blood pressure monitoring.









FeverPAIN score of 2 or 3: Do not offer an antibiotic. Ask the individual to return to Community Pharmacy within 3-5 days if no improvement for pharmacist reassesament.

- FeverPAIN score of 4 or 5 with mild symptoms: Ask the individual to return to Community Pharmacy within 3-5 days if no improvement for pharmaciat reassessment.
- Failed previous antibiotic for this episode of sore throat

Information and Advice Discuss the following advice with the patient

- Provide <u>patient information leaflet</u> (PIL) provided with the original pack.
- Provide the <u>TARGET RTI leaflet</u>.
- · Use TARGET antibiotic checklist to counsel patient.
- Explain that the tablets or suspension are to be taken orally, on an empty stomach (30 minutes before food or 2 hours after food). Reconstituted solutions may need to be stored in the fridge.
- Advise to take medicine at regular intervals and complete the course, even if symptoms improve.
- Seek medical attention immediately if condition deteriorates and/or individual becomes systemically unwell, or if symptoms worsen rapidly or significantly at any time.
- Advise to seek medical advice if no improvement after completion of the treatment course.
- Advise individual that if signs of hypersensitivity occur, stop taking the medicine and seek immediate medical advice.
- Inform patient or representative of possible side effects and their management.
- If the individual is affected by dizziness or drowsiness advise them not to drive or operate machinery.
- Advise individual/carer/parent/guardian to seek immediate medical attention (by calling 999 or going to A&E) if the individual develops signs or symptoms of sepsis.
- Advise safe disposal of medicines.
